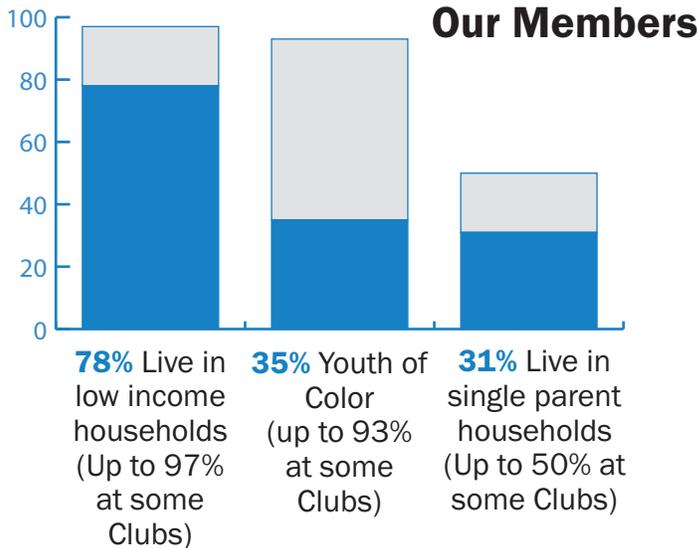

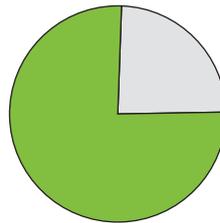

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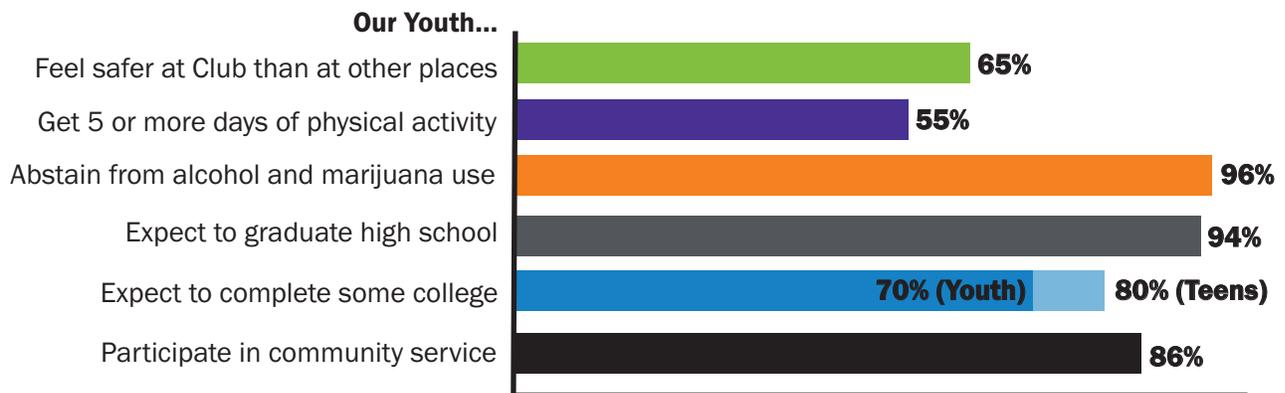


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National Youth Outcomes Initiative Survey

2020 Wrap Up

Events of the last year have resulted in a great deal of change for our Clubs. Through each phase of the pandemic, we adapted every aspect of our programs and operations to best support our youth. We provided virtual activities and mentorship, emergency childcare for children of essential workers and first-responders, and meals for families experiencing food insecurity. In June 2020, we resumed in-Club activities with limited enrollment and stringent safety measures.

We hired a dedicated STEM coordinator and several specialists to increase the frequency of age-appropriate STEM enrichment activities at each Club site. We offered one-on-one STEM tutoring for teens to help with credit recovery and fight learning loss. We also deployed mobile technology and Wi-Fi hotspots to enable STEM learning and tutoring beyond the walls of our Clubs.

Due to varied school closures and approaches to online and distance learning, we expanded operating hours. When schools were closed to in-person classes, we offered distance learning support including access to devices and internet connection and additional staff and staff hours to support learning.

We enhanced our impact with the addition of a Nutrition Specialist to our staff team. We also expanded meal programs to include high-nutrition snacks, meals, and food bags for youth and families experiencing food insecurity.

To ensure our youth were safe, we strictly complied with federal, state, and local guidelines regarding COVID-19. Specific strategies to mitigate risk included temperature checks, symptom checks, mask wearing, reduced group sizes, a limited number of individuals allowed in a facility, social distancing requirements, hand-washing, sanitation between-group movements, and frequent sanitation of entire facilities.
